Swanage Railway Arrives at Wareham!

4th April 2023 at 11.09, the first Swanage Railway service enters Wareham station from Corfe Castle.



Yes, the first train of the 90-day trial arrived at Wareham on time and to a crowded platform of passengers, supporters, photographers, dignitaries and TV cameras.

The service featured on both the local evening news programmes of BBC South Today, and ITV Meridian.

Of course, the return working was fully loaded, but there are another 89 days to go before we can really tell what the future holds for this service. Undoubtedly, there will be much coverage in various outlets, and future issues of Swanning Around . Check out social media for much more coverage today.

The train consisting of the three-car class117 unit and the single-car 121 unit has arrived to a packed platform at Wareham.

And below, the moment when the train comes off the Swanage Branch and joins the Southampton to Weymouth main line at Worgret Junction.





The Steam Gala on 24th-26th March has been hailed as a success, always good in these financially difficult times. Helping us to put on a good show were two visiting engines . British Railways Standard Class 4 2-6-0 no. 76084 from the North Norfolk Railway, and British Railways Standard Class 7 pacific no. 70000 *Britannia* courtesy of Locomotive Services Limited of Crewe.

In the pictures below, 76084 is working hard on the gradient from the River Frome to Holme Lane bridge on 26th March, while *Britannia* crosses bridge 11 at Furzebrook on 25th March.







Here's 76084 heading for Norden and the River Frome limit of Swanage Railway operations, passing the iconic ruins of Corfe Castle.

And here we have 34028 *Eddystone* also in the way to the River Frome passing Motala on 25th March. Motala was once the limit of the Swanage Railway until we were able to take over the rest of the branch to near the main line.

Another picture of 76084, this time bringing up the rear of a train passing Cat's Eye on 25th March, with a well-filled Pullman Observation Car 14.

Below, 34070 *Manston* powers up the gradient from the River Frome, here passing Creech Bottom and Furzebrook Heath on 25th March. Firemen George Miller and Josh Voce at the cab, while trailing locomotive *Eddystone* has steam to spare.

And yet another picture of 76084! This time sees the loco powering up to Holme Lane bridge on 25th March with the River Frome half a mile behind. The long lens shot accentuates the gradient and makes the picture! Driver and Chief Traction Inspector Nigel Clark in charge.

Just two more pictures of trains at the gala! Above, *Britannia* crosses the Wytch Farm road at Norden Gates heading another trip to the River Frome on 26th March.

A short goods train also ran between Swanage and Corfe Castle offering brake van rides. Here 34070 *Manston* starts away from Corfe on a return trip to Swanage on 26th March.



There's more to a gala than just the trains. It's the people!

Britannia crosses the road at Norden Gates on 26th March with Crossing Keeper Graham Hale operating the crossing barriers and ready for the single line token exchanges. Driver Stuart Cotton and Fireman Gary Cox in the cab.



Meanwhile, on the other side of the road, the team of shunters is ready to detach the trailing loco at Norden station.

34028 *Eddystone* eases across the road with driver Ian McDavid on 26th March, and shunters at the ready.





The shunters come from all ranks in Operations department. Cleaner Kadin Jacques uncouples 31806 from the rear of the train with Passed Cleaner George Miller observing.

70000 *Britannia* arrived at Swanage off the main line after a trip from Crewe. There to meet it at Wareham on 22nd March, Swanage Railway's conductor driver Ian McDavid chats to Locomotive Services' Oscar Martin at the cab window prior to moving the loco and its support coach onto the Swanage branch. Oscar is also a Swanage Railway driver and traction inspector.

Britannia also had an extra week in Swanage Railway service with five days of driver experience trips, and will be going back home to Crewe next week.





76084 being loaded up for the trip back to the North Norfolk Railway on 30th March didn't stop Phil Minshall from painting the fence at Norden!

And it was the Telecomms team's day to come and fix things, and Geoff Trim is checking the signal post telephones from the Norden Gates crossing box to make sure they work.





As we know, our permanent way team is always busy doing something, and this last month has seen them working on a bridge repair at bridge 11 at Furzebrook, over the old Fayles tramway route now used as an exit from Blue Pool.

Timbers under and between the rails needed replacement prior to the use of the line for the Steam Gala and the Wareham service.

There's the bridge above, and right the old bearer beams are lifted out.



The new beams and timbers are in and the rails replaced and the bridge is nearly ready to hand back for operations.

It highlighted a number of concerns across many areas of our Railway. This will lead into an <u>on-line</u> **Open Forum** that will take place on Thu 12 Apr at 1900hrs – information will be released shortly on SR Staff, the SRT website and by email. Please register your interest to attend.

I am delighted that John Denison has welcomed a new approach, allowing **Swanning Around** to be used as a 'platform' to improve communications; specifically so that information on future events, plans, projects and strategy can be quickly disseminated across all areas of our working railway.

The problem with communication is that when there is none, people tend to fill that vacuum with, well, anything! What we aim to provide here is **Consistent Communication**, in a way that suits the majority of those who help to support the operation of the railway on a day-by-day basis – whilst being well aware that this will be read across the public domain.

Spring Gala and Britannia Driving Experience. Company Chairman Trevor Parsons would like to thank everyone who supported the recent events, which proved to be very popular, and has provided a welcome boost as we start the season off.
