The main draw at the Roads to Rail event was the steam engines, of course. Of particular interest was the working steam engine-powered saw bench seen here with 34028 *Eddystone* running round its train at Norden.

More steam engines, little and large, in the parade ring.

Not only steam at the event, but classic tractors and classic cars, stationary engines, dodgems and other fairground rides, plus various vendors, and not forgetting the marquee containing the bar and evening entertainment.




The day wouldn't be complete without a visit to the cab of a steam locomotive.

Among the movements in June that didn't involve a steam engine were shunt moves to take Bulleid coach 4365 to Norden for onward transport for storage at Margate, and collection of the Pullman Observation Car 14 which was the return load from storage to Dorset.

As this all happened in the week before Roads to Rail and the shunting neck at Norden was needed for the event, so the opportunity was taken to move the T3's tender parts out of the way.

The shunter 08 436 has the coach 4365 at one end and the tender vehicles on the other, getting ready to shunt the whole lot across the level crossing.

The next day, Car 14 has arrived at Norden on S A Smith's lorry.
