The T3's tender was moved from secure storage in early December to allow work to start on its refurbishment. Currently located at Norden, Nick Lloyd and Peter Frost started work on it and are seen here removing the brake system weigh shaft. Not easy when the last time it had any attention may have been over 70 years ago!

Only a few tools needed. Above, Nick uses the special linear impact device to assist removal of fixings, while Peter, below, operates the appropriate lifting equipment as they remove the shaft.

It is intended that the chassis will be relocated to Herston Works in due course to allow work to continue.

In previous issues of Swanning Around, we may have mentioned that 34070 *Manston* has been at the Tyseley Locomotive Works in Birmingham for some attention after a little contretemps.

We can now report that, on 23rd December, *Manston* was repatriated to Herston Works for Southern Locomotives' staff and volunteers to finish putting all the bits back on it, with a view to the loco returning to service in the not too distant future. More in a 2022 issue of SA.

It's the fiftieth anniversary of the last train operated by British Rail on the branch between Wareham and Swanage, prior to closure.

To celebrate (?) this milestone in history, Swanage Railway will be running a special diesel service over three days of the New Year.

Operated by ex-British Railways 1960-built three-carriage Class 117 diesel multiple unit, the five trains a day service will be operating between Swanage and Norden from 10.30am to 4pm daily on Saturday 1st January, Sunday 2nd January, and Monday 3rd January, 2022.

To mark the last British Rail train and closure 50th anniversary, the first 50 people purchasing tickets on-line for each of the three days – from the Swanage Railway's website at swanagerailway.co.uk – only paid the January, 1972, last British Rail train fare of 50 pence per person. All other ticket holders will pay the full 2021 price! A special commemorative heritage Edmondson card ticket will be produced for all ticket holders travelling between 1st and 3rd January, 2022, inclusive.

Driving the diesel train on the first day will be Peter Frost, who also travelled on the last train in 1972.
