A Look At What's Happening Around The Swanage Railway

It's February, half term has just been and gone, we've had visits from Ciara and Dennis, but we still have more important stuff to report! Yes, the return of the class 117 Diesel unit for the Wareham service!

In spite of all manner of obstructions, the unit finally arrived back at Corfe Castle in mid-February, and Andrew P M Wright's picture of the first vehicle (51356 for those who like numbers) passing over the bridge at Wareham as a South Western Railway service for Weymouth passes beneath has become almost iconic.

But it's not all about the 117. We have, as usual, all sorts of other stuff in this issue, but it's a fraction of all the activity needed to keep the railway going. We always need more help! Read on to see why, and how you can contribute.



It's been a long time coming, but the class 117 Diesel unit has arrived back at its Corfe Castle depot after an extended overhaul to main line condition at Eastleigh. How it got there has something of a farce about it, as it was due to be collected by rail in early January.

Firstly, this was thwarted by a lineside installation at Brockenhurst, which rendered the unit unable to pass muster with Network Rail's gauging computer—he say No!

When arrangements had been made to transport the 117 vehicles by road from Eastleigh, an unlucky container train found the dodgy rail fixings and derailed at Eastleigh station, and broke the points, preventing the move of the unit from Eastleigh Works to the pick-up point in Eastleigh East Yard!

At the third attempt, Gareth Buscombe was able to transport four vehicles back to Dorset. Four? Yes a spare power car vehicle also returned.

On 4th February, the vehicles have reached Eastleigh East Yard, and they're in the middle of Mervyn Turvey's picture.





It's late afternoon on 12th February, and power car 51356 has arrived at Norden.

By 14th February, all three vehicles are back at Corfe Castle, and have joined the single-car class 121 'Bubble Car' at the main line depot. The unit was due to start training runs on 21st February, but yet another obstruction, this time on the Norden to River Frome extension, prevented this from happening. Jinxed? We hope not!

Negotiations with Imerys, the clay people, over what to do with **their** tree on **our** line were in progress as this picture was taken on 12th February.



Also in progress at Furzebrook on 12th February was erection of scaffolding on the bridge to enable Dorset Council to carry out maintenance. A speed restriction of 5mph enables trains to continue to pass underneath, on the running line.



Meanwhile, down at Harmans Cross on 18th February, the enterprising camp site owner has a fine flock of sheep mowing his grass. This one is eyeing us up, perhaps looking for Alan?





Bob Bunyar has rescued some lamp bodies from storage at Swanage, and is in the process of smartening them up to look good on the shelves of the Harmans Cross Lamp Hut.

While we conduct signalman training in Harmans Cross signal box, painter Phil Minshall is outside on the scaffolding in the lee of the weather doing the window frames. This work is being extended past the half term week owing to the particularly foul weather we've been having recently.

The wind outside was so strong at times that it was not possible to hold a camera still!

Swanage Railway, like other railways and attractions run by volunteers, is always under financial and regulatory pressure, and as the organisation grows, so does the responsibility the management takes on. Swanage Railway management recognises the need for change, and, to that end, is running a series of forums to inform members of proposed changes to governance. This will enable the organisation to respond better to changes in regulation and to gain more opportunities for financial grants and tax breaks.

The first of these forums on 15th February was well attended by over 60 members, and was presented by Trust chairman Gavin Johns. More forums (or is it fora?) are being scheduled, the next one, for Swanage Railway Trust members only, being in the community room at the Mowlem on Saturday 29th February, starting at 17.30.

Changes or tightening in regulation often mean more money has to be spent to maintain conformance, and the footbridge at Corfe Castle is just such an example.

Estates manager Pat Cattle fixes new non-slip material to the boards with David Budd. New treads have already been fitted, and that stuff costs a packet. Another reason why our volunteer-run charity has to continuously look for sources of funding. There's no way the fare box can keep up with all the expenses!



The 4TC Group's DTSO (**D**riving **T**railer **S**econd **O**pen) no 76322 is having a funding shortfall, owing to additional work required to fix more rust damage than was anticipated. The vehicle is at Rampart Engineering , and has been stripped back to bare metal to reveal the various repairs needed.
